



2009 Antiviral Drugs

What are antiviral drugs?

- ÉAntiviral drugs are prescription medications that decrease the ability of flu viruses to reproduce in your body
- ÉThese drugs can reduce the severity of flu and shorten the length of illness.
- ÉAntivirals come in pill, liquid and inhaler forms under the names Tamiflu® or Relenza ® .
- ÉThese drugs can be used to treat both seasonal and H1N1 influenza.
- ÉThese drugs can be used in some people as a way to prevent the flu.
- ÉGetting a flu vaccine is still the most important step in protection against flu.

Who should be treated with antiviral drugs?

- ÉMost people with flu will recover without treatment.
- ÉYour health care provider will decide if you need to be treated.
- ÉTreatment is recommended for certain people, such as those with more severe illness, who are hospitalized, or are at higher risk of complications.

What people are considered higher risk for complications from influenza ?

- ÉChildren younger than 2 years old
- ÉPregnant women
- ÉPeople younger than 19 years of age who are receiving long-term aspirin therapy
- ÉPeople with certain chronic medical conditions
- ÉPeople aged 65 years and older

Can antiviral drugs be used to prevent flu?

- ÉAntivirals can be used on a limited basis to help prevent influenza infection.

ÉPeople who cannot have the flu vaccine may be able to use these drugs to keep from getting the flu.

What side effects can occur with antiviral drugs?

- ÉSide effects differ for each drug.
- ÉIf you are prescribed one of these drugs, ask your doctor to explain the possible side-effects.

Will everyone with influenza need antiviral drugs?

- ÉAntiviral drugs are not needed for most people with flu.
- ÉAntivirals work best if started within the first 2 days of flu symptoms.
- ÉIf too many people use these drugs the chances are greater that the virus could become resistant to them.
- ÉYour health care provider is the best one to decide whether antiviral drugs are best for you.
